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Notes to WI Programme Secretaries

1. If writing to a Speaker by post, always enclose a stamped addressed envelope for a reply. If contacting a Speaker by email, print any replies as proof of confirmation.
2. Please remember that all bookings made by telephone should be confirmed in writing. This can either be in a letter or email format. The fee and travel expenses should be agreed immediately afterwards, giving the appropriate details of date, time and place of meeting. The Speaker should also be told how much time is allowed for the talk or demonstration. It would be most helpful if, when writing to speakers or demonstrators, a contact telephone number is given which could be used by the Speaker in the event of a last minute emergency.

3. A reminder, giving the necessary directions both to and from the meeting, should be sent at least a week beforehand. It is often difficult to find the way to a hall on a dark winters evening so a good, well drawn map is very useful. Postcodes of venues can also be useful for those using Satellite Navigation.
4. It is worth finding out the travelling expenses beforehand and the length and method of the Speakers journey. It is the duty of the WI to appoint a Hostess to welcome and look after the Speaker, introduce them to the President and see to their comfort. Don't forget to leave a parking space for them and do help them with any boxes etc.
5. Speakers fees and travelling expenses should always be paid at the meeting, and by bank transfer or cheque payable to them personally and not to a national charity.
6. Do see that adequate table space and any requested equipment is made available before the start of a meeting.
7. Do not keep the Speaker waiting if they arrive promptly. If necessary, the remainder of the business could be postponed until the end of the talk.
8. The Federation has agreed with these Speakers that the information contained in the Speakers Handbook is for the use of Huntingdon and Peterborough WIs. Please do not pass the information on to anyone else. In accordance with GDPR, please ensure all earlier editions are destroyed.
9. Finally; use local talent whenever possible, especially during winter months; keep a look-out in the local press for ideas; do not be afraid of trying something new and remember—a WI with a dull programme cannot expect to gain new members or even keep their present ones.

95% of domestic abuse survivors have experienced financial abuse, with no funds to provide basic household items.

50% of domestic abuse survivors don't have enough money for essentials for their children.

The support we provide is as follows:

Signposting individuals in need of support to qualified professionals specialising in domestic abuse.

Our '**Back to Life Support Project**' helps families who have fled domestic abuse in their hour of need by sourcing items for their home, such as white goods, flooring and furniture.

Social activities for emotional well-being and peer support, such as the monthly Angel Walk and Talks, coffee mornings and weekly support groups.

Provide 'listening ear' **mental health support**, counselling, and group therapy.

8. My Life as a Micro Artist

The most amazing and unusual presentation you are likely to see - thought-provoking, awe-inspiring and highly entertaining.

I knew, the day I left school at the age of 15 without any qualifications, that I had already failed on an epic scale. This was brought home to me when I secured my first job - emptying mouse traps in a Birmingham factory. The only positive memory I took from school, was of an inspiring English teacher, who explained how anyone could succeed at the highest level imaginable. Inspired by this same teacher, two of my class-mates went on to become world-renowned rock musicians, another became an Olympic runner and another pupil is now a television household name. The teacher's parting words, to me as I left school for the last time, were, "For the rest of your life, remember, if you want to achieve, you must think differently and behave differently. Think the same as everyone else, and you will achieve just the same."

This advice led me to securing the most enviable and prestigious client list imaginable, which included Buckingham Palace, Windsor Castle, Balmoral, Sandringham, The National Gallery, Rolls Royce, Chanel, Harrods, Fortnum & Mason, Richard Branson, Andrew Lloyd-Webber, Kim Kardashian, Elton John, Uri Geller and many, many other celebrities.

I am now considered by multi-millionaire fine-art investors around the globe to be the most talented artist alive today. Of course I don't believe it, but, being a thick Brummie, I'm sure you will understand when I say, it's good for my ego to hear this!

After carving The Lord's Prayer on the head of a pin, and engraving the words, 'Nothing is Impossible' along the sharp edge of a Wilkinson Sword razor blade, and the smallest portrait in the world of the Queen (on a gold disc inside the eye of a needle), I have appeared in many news, radio and television features internationally, and been the subject of a Discovery Channel documentary. Two years ago, a film of my art was shown at the annual Art and Film Festival in Hollywood.

An interesting venture, which brought me massive media coverage in 58 countries around the world, was when I engraved a portrait of Jane Austen on four £5 notes, then travelled around Britain, spending them in small shops. These four notes were valued at £50,000 each.

I go to greater lengths than anyone else in the world in an effort to produce art on such a minute scale. Working from midnight to 5.00 am, to avoid vibration from passing traffic, I lower my pulse to 20 beats a minute with the aid of potassium, magnesium and beta-blockers, and while wearing a stethoscope I engrave between heartbeats when I am perfectly still. Regular injections of Botox into my eyelids ensure there is no distraction from eye-muscles and nerves. At the age of 76 I still swim 8,000 metres every day. The reasoning is that the fitter I am, the lower

my resting heart-rate, which gives me a good base to work from. I am also a former European champion and record holder - 200m butterfly and 1500m freestyle.

I have many funny anecdotes to relate, concerning the celebrities and Royals I have met and worked with. (I am also the Royal engraver, and have been, for the last 35 years).

I will ensure that your members are thrilled with my presentation and are left talking about it long after it ends. I will add, your members will tell you it's the best talk they have ever heard. If they don't say this, you needn't pay me! As you are aware, no other speaker would ever dare say this to you.

One last point, if your members don't like laughing, then my 60-minute presentation is not for you!

Talk ONE - *Bandstands - History, Decline and Revival* - A talk on the history of the Bandstand, from their origins in the mid-18th century to their heyday during the Victorian park making era, and their subsequent decline post World War Two. This talk is a slide show that follows this fascinating history and the recent revival of the bandstand in our public parks. This is a highly illustrative talk that engages many and fascinates the listener and has had excellent feedback from those who have heard this engaging talk. **THIS IS A VERY POPULAR TALK**

Talk TWO - *A Concise History of our Great British Public Parks* - This really is a fascinating insight into the history of one of our greatest ever institutions - our great British public park. We have all enjoyed them at some time in our lives but what do we really know about them? their origins? did they really start in the Victorian period or do they go even further back? This talk illustrates their origins, talks about the need for parks, the Victorian heyday, what makes a great park, with examples of lodges, lakes, bandstands, fountains and floral displays, to their great decline in the sixties and seventies. However, the subsequent revival has led to a major shift in interest in our parks and once again we are much in love with them. This is also a highly illustrative talk accompanied by slides with examples of parks from across the UK and their designs and architecture. This is a particularly popular talk and always goes down well as we can nearly always recount our own experiences with our own local park.

Talk THREE - *London's Royal Parks* - London's royal parks are among its most beautiful and beloved spaces: just as much as the Houses of Parliament, Buckingham Palace or St Pancras Station, the mere mention of Hyde or Regent's Park is enough to evoke the capital in all its glory for residents and tourists alike. They have a grand history - some were royally owned as far back as the Norman conquest, others were acquired by Henry VIII during the Reformation - and since being opened to the public during the eighteenth century, they have hosted some of London's great events, including the Great Exhibition and innumerable jubilees and celebrations. This talk tells the story of all eight of the parks from the point when they were acquired by the monarchy until the present day, including the major historic moments and events with which they are associated.

Talk FOUR - *Parks, People and Places - A Life in Landscape* - This is really a talk about me!! from my beginnings as a landscape architect in Jersey to Carlisle City Council, to Middlesbrough Council, into consultancy at Halcrow and then as Head of Parks at Watford, Southend-on-Sea and to Norwich. Its a journey through my career, telling the stories of many of the small to large projects over the years I have worked on - multi-million pound park restoration projects to small scale community projects with local unemployed men, to wandering around the Scottish Borders or the Isle of Wight looking at allotments and play areas. I also have designed many private gardens over the years and tell the stories of some of the more bizarre requests from clients, to more recent escapades in writing and researching bandstands across the country. 35 years and counting, it is another talk that is engaging and enlightens the listener into the world of the landscape architect and parks manager with a weird slant on why I am obsessed with bandstands and is also illustrated with slides.
